

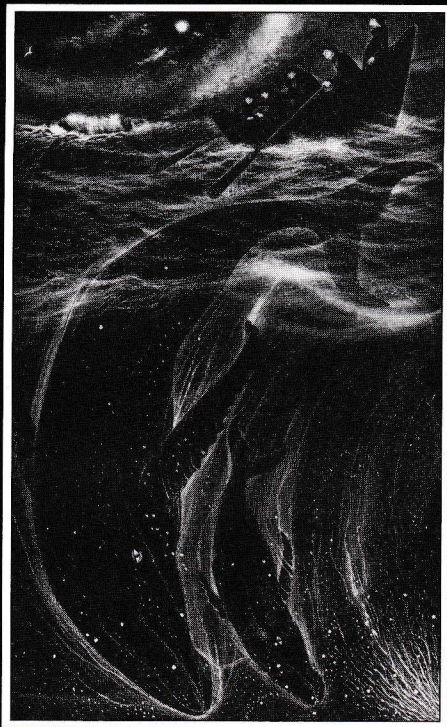

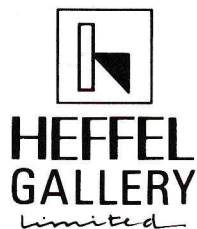

This exhibition at the Heffel Gallery consists of monotypes, etchings, and paintings. A monotype is a print which results in only one unique image being produced. Blackwood's monotypes are done on a glass plate—essentially a painting on glass. Then the paper is laid over the oil painted glass and the image is hand transferred by rubbing. The oil monotypes are interesting because what results is a translucence and washy feeling of a watercolour but with the rich colour of oil, as Blackwood uses oil paint on the glass. The new group of monotypes are of lush, flowering gardens behind his house and studio. Blackwood sets up his table and paints on the glass in the middle of his garden, creating a wonderful immediacy and vibrant rich colour in the work.

Two new copper plate etchings will be released for the exhibition. The etchings represent Blackwood's earlier years in Wesleyville, Newfoundland, where both his father and Grandfather were Sea Captains. William Gough states in *The Art of David Blackwood* that Wesleyville "Was a town of the sea, of people who lived by and for the ocean." In the etchings each object is its own page in a novel, detailing every aspect of life in Wesleyville. Blackwood's etchings are similar to novels, not in the narrative sense, but more like the multiple layers of meaning and feeling, that one understands upon completion of a novel. The etchings, therefore, visually convey an overall sensation, packed full of content, beyond narration, similar to one's memories of historical events. The memories in Blackwood's etchings are of events and histories of Wesleyville, Newfoundland.

Oil paintings by Blackwood will be shown for the first time in Vancouver. The Heffel Gallery has been planning a major Blackwood exhibition for two years. This will be Blackwood's only exhibition this year in Canada.

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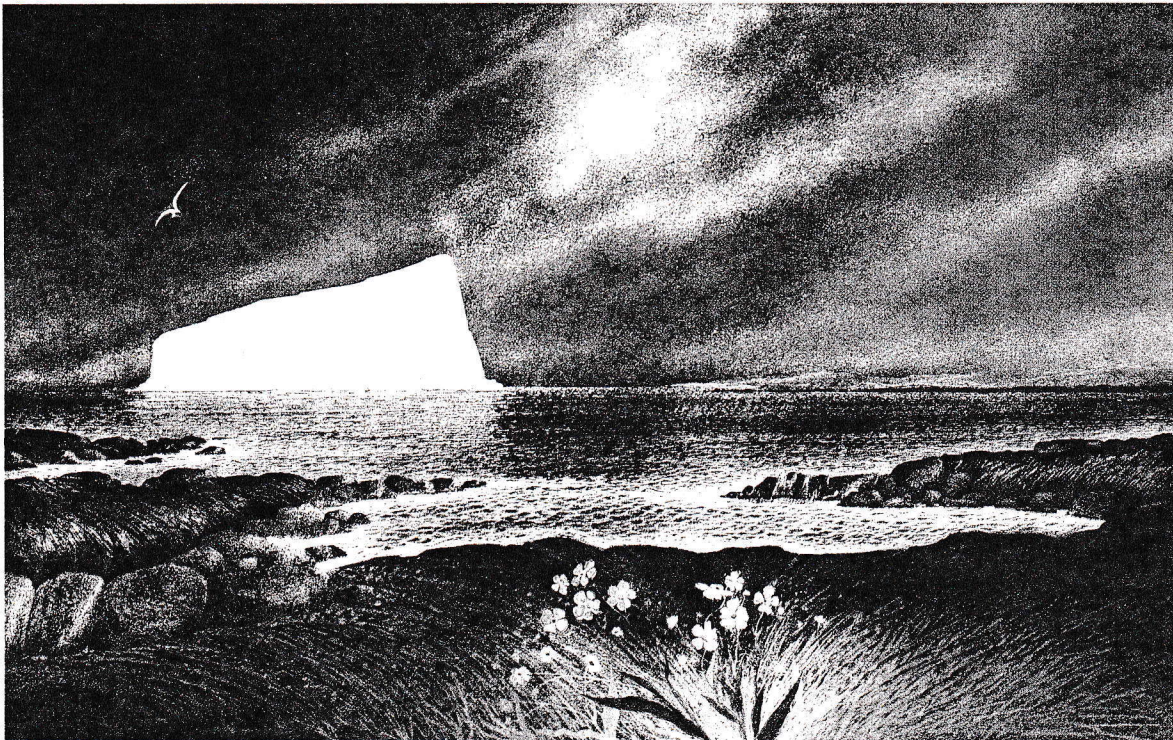

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A Form of Meditation

NEW WATERCOLOURS

THE FIRST THING THAT STRUCK ME ABOUT DAVID BLACKWOOD'S STUNNING NEW COLLECTION OF WATERCOLOURS IS THE REMARKABLE CAST OF LIGHT THAT INFUSES THE PAINTINGS.

Light is often a peripheral presence in Blackwood's best-known work, whether in the torches of sealers adrift in the cavernous winter night, the helpless ship ablaze in *Fire Down on the Labrador*, the tangential gleam of sunrise or sunset just offstage in his many seascapes. Even the brilliant sun in *Hauling Job Sturge's House* feels more like the stark glow of ice and stars that frequently illuminate his etchings. Blackwood has always placed human endeavour within the looming scale of ocean and iceberg and relentless night. Set against the monumental indifference of the natural world, the red light of a torch or a kerosene lamp seems both ephemeral and heroic—much like the outpost lives that have been a Blackwood obsession throughout his career.

These new still-life meditations are instantly recognizable as Blackwood's work but there is a fundamental shift in focus and tone here. The natural world, when it appears at all, is a civilized presence—a cultivated garden through a window, a placid sea barely distinguishable from the glass or polished table in the foreground. And the cut flowers, the garden trees and bowls of fruit at the heart of each painting are receptacles or vehicles for light. The tree in *Sunburst Magnolia* haloed like a portrait of a saint. Flowers set over calm seascapes in *Deco Vase* and *Deruta* and *Chinese Dogwood*, the bouquets suffused and glowing, as if they were the sunrise itself.

It was a 2005 David Milne exhibit at the Art Gallery of Ontario that inspired Blackwood's return to the watercolour medium for the first time in ten years. His idea, he says, was to combine the free, unpredictable nature of watercolour with the architectural structure and exquisite drawing that have always been a hallmark of his work. The struggle to combine these contradictory practices he compares to writing music, the reaching after "some sort of hard to explain (inexplicable) grace."

It's a telling detail that a copy of Dante's *Paradiso* occupies a prominent corner in the painting of the same name. Where so much of Blackwood's earlier work was set in the volatile, even hostile, physical world of Newfoundland and the Labrador coast, these new watercolours seem more concerned with an internal spiritual landscape. And the light that makes the stillness brim with life suggests something beyond the provisional nature of human existence. A peace that passeth understanding. Something nearly eternal.

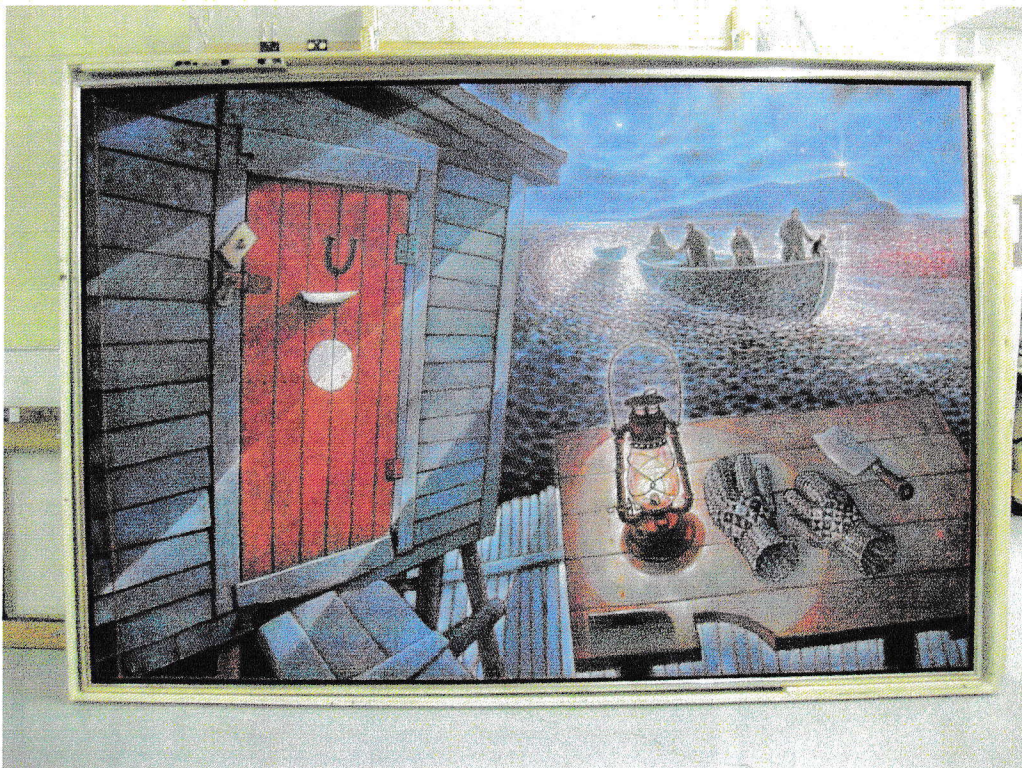

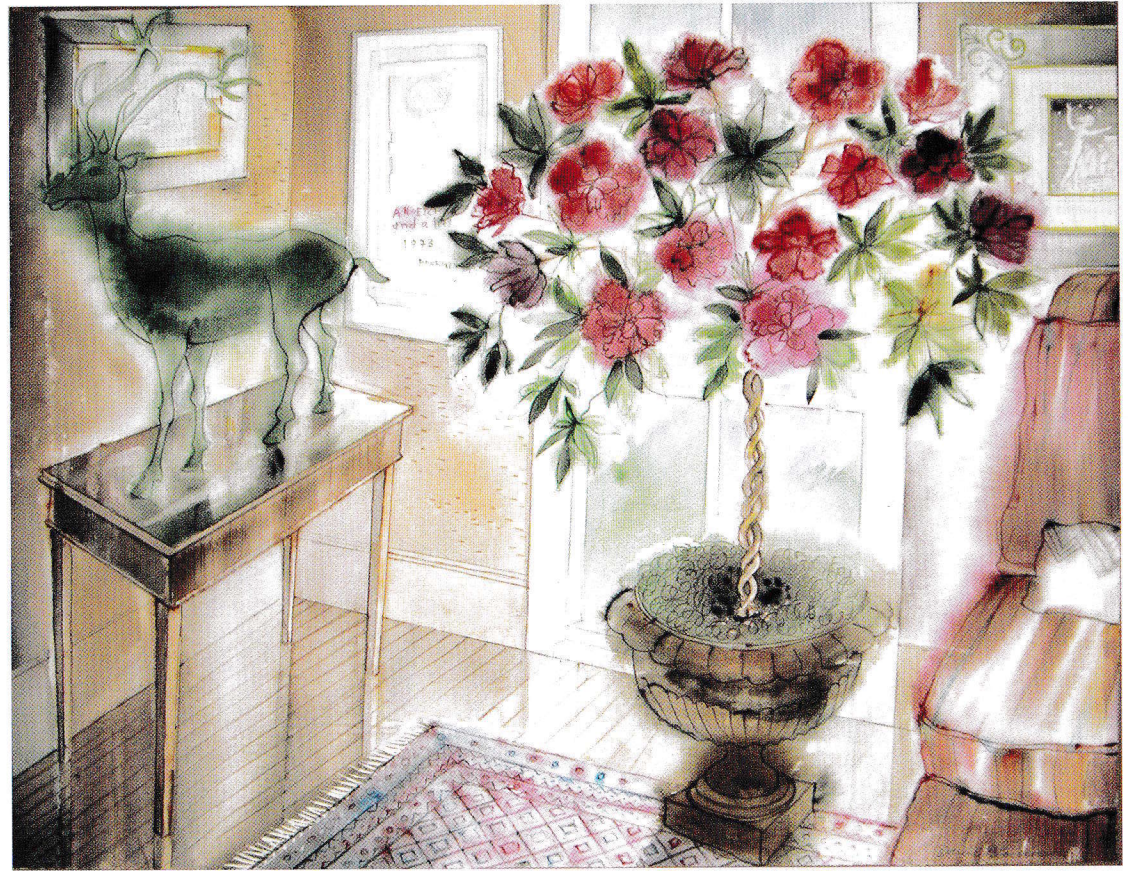
Abbozzo Gallery will be donating a portion of the sales from this exhibition to help further the work of the *Partners In The Horn of Africa*.

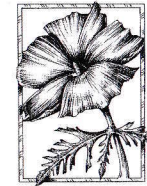
DAVID L. BLACKWOOD C.M., OOnt., R.C.A., C.P.E.

David Blackwood's depictions of the life, the landscape, and the people of Newfoundland have, over the past four decades, produced a body of work which holds a special place in the Canadian imagination. His strangely beautiful images have come to represent to many the essence of Newfoundland's traditional culture. Part personal biography, part cultural document, part mythic narrative, his work forms an ongoing chronicle of the distinctive stories, both epic and personal, which have shaped his life and the life of his beloved native province. He is widely regarded as one of this country's most accomplished artists, and his work is represented in numerous major public and corporate art collections worldwide, including the National Gallery of Canada, the National Gallery of Australia, the Uffizi in Florence, the Art Gallery of Ontario, the Montreal Museum of Fine Arts, the Chase Manhattan Bank, and the Collection of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II.

Mr. Blackwood founded the Erindale College Art Gallery, University of Toronto, which was later renamed the Blackwood Gallery in his honour. In addition to many international awards and fellowships, he is the recipient of two honorary doctorates: a Doctor of Laws from the University of Calgary and a Doctor of Letters from Memorial University in St. John's, Newfoundland. He was awarded the Order of Canada in 1993 for his outstanding contributions to the cultural life and heritage of Canada. In 2003 he received the Order of Ontario in recognition of his contributions as an artist, teacher, and benefactor of the arts. He has served on the Boards of numerous cultural, heritage, and charitable organizations over the years, including the Board of Directors of the Art Gallery of Ontario, with which he has had a long association. In 2000 the Art Gallery of Ontario, Marvin Gelber Print and Drawing Centre, established a Blackwood Research Centre for the study of the artist's work. In November of 2003 he was elected Honourary Chairman of the Board of the Art Gallery of Ontario – the first practicing artist to be named to this post. Mr. Blackwood currently resides in Port Hope, Ontario and maintains a studio in Wesleyville, Newfoundland.

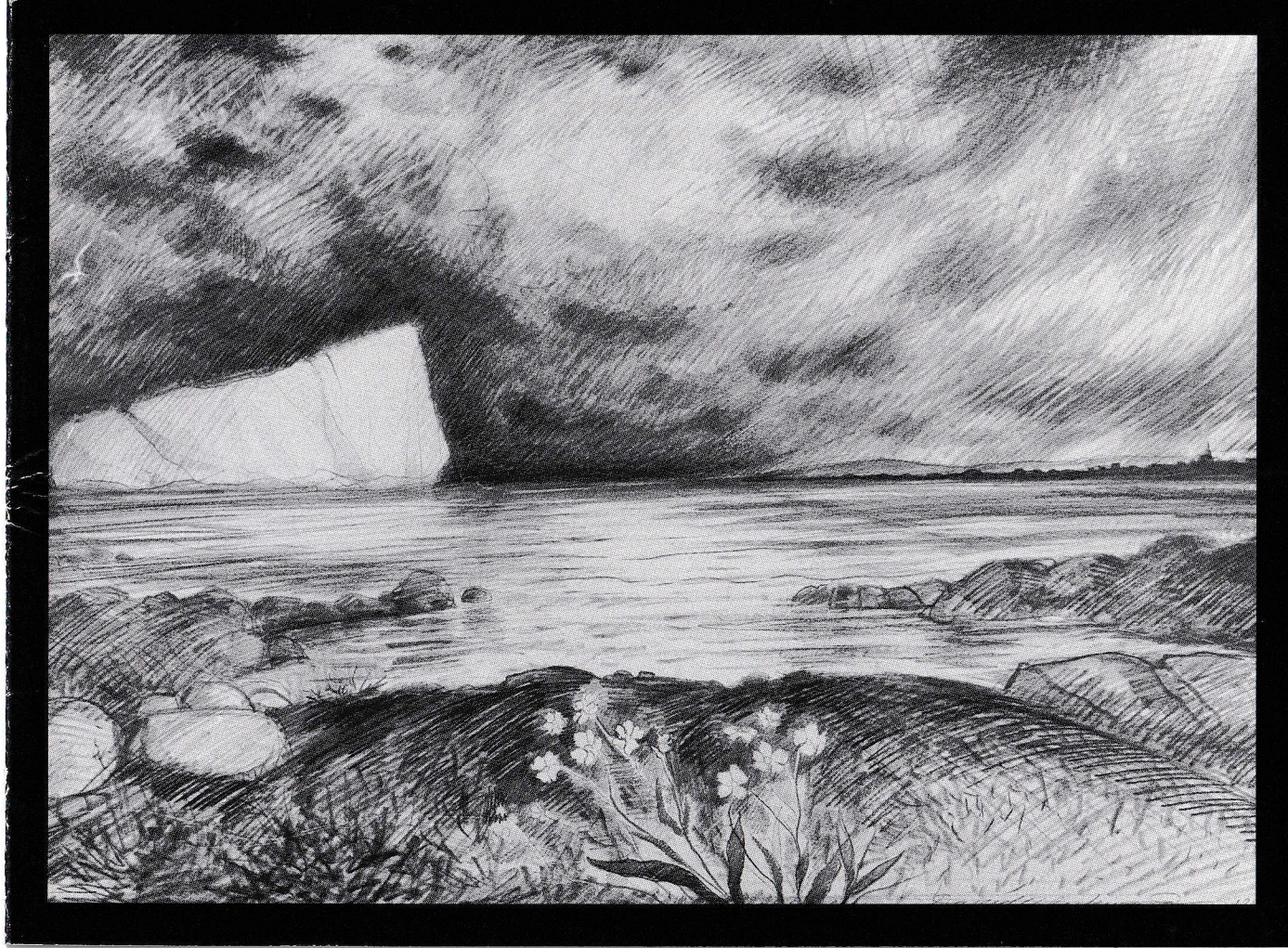

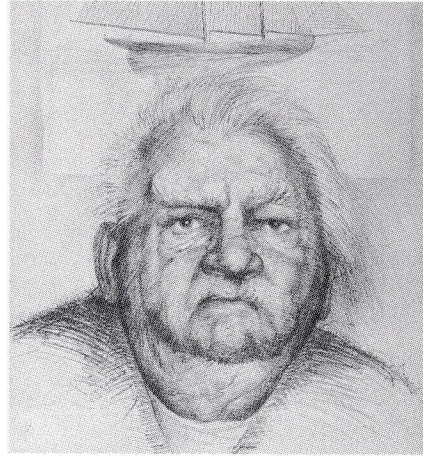

For David Blackwood, drawing has always been an essential part of the working process; his initial means of exploring any artistic idea. The constant discipline of expressing himself in pencil on paper has produced a remarkable body of work



which, while rarely exhibited, is fundamentally important to our understanding of his work. Whether they are created as rough drafts preparatory to an etching or painting, jotted as brief on-site notations, or worked up into highly finished compositions which stand alone, Blackwood's drawings display the practiced hand of a master. But beyond the sheer beauty of technique, they also allow us the pleasure of glimpsing, in a very intimate and direct way, the artist's mind at work as it explores an idea. They capture a largely private activity which artists rarely share with the public - the unedited flow of imagery through the fingertips, the tentative explorations of an idea before it is fully resolved. Most

importantly, they provide us with a unique graphic record of the way in which the creative imagination works as it moves from the initial spark of inspiration to its ultimate expression. - Ken Forsyth

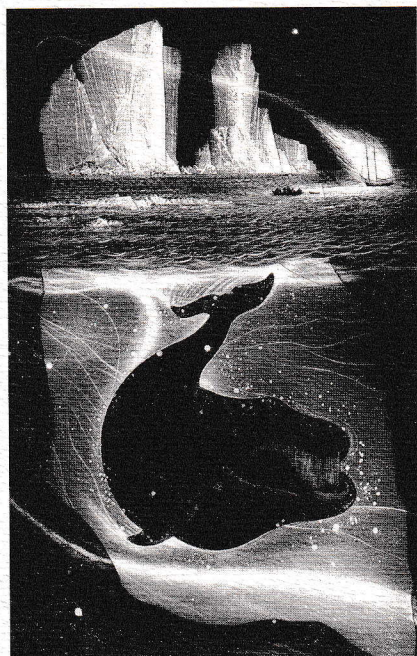

p in outport Newfoundland during the 1940's and 1950's, I was surrounded by all the essential of the traditional Cod Fishery. Both my father's and mother's families were deeply involved for generations in the Labrador and inshore fisheries. Labrador schooners, sails, cod traps, trap boats, twine lofts, fish flakes, cod liver barrels, splitting knives, splitting tables, rubber clothes and rubber boots were part of everyday life. A smart young man from St. John's, an assistant to Premier Joey Smallwood, stated he could hardly stand the smell I had to put up with in church hall gatherings at election time. Clean and all dressed up for the occasion, the fishermen and their families still carried the aroma of cod, the cod fish!

of the cod fishery in recent years has caused me to reflect on this ancient way of life and how it is the essential character of Newfoundland. Concern for the disappearing Cod and the death of a fisherman led me to produce my first image using this fish - "For Ishmael Tiller; The Lrdgy Rocks" in 1990. Other related images followed, "Grandma Glover on Bragg's Island" 1991, "Notes from the North" 1992, "Folded Studies" 1993, "Master Mariner" 1994, and "Wesleyville Fleet in the Labrador" 1994. These reflections have also inspired a new series of paintings and the first of these works were shown in Edmonton in 1994.

From Kelloway's Door series (1985-1993) explored a variety of media, including the Renaissance technique of oil tempera. It seemed the ideal medium for conveying the simple and timeless roughness which is associated with the cod fish culture as I knew it on the North Coast of Newfoundland. The oil tempera employs powdered pigments suspended in an egg and oil emulsion. The underpainting is built up in a monochromatic grey scale using a series of painting knives. Colour is achieved with successive oil glazes. The result is a transparent and reflective light quality uncharacteristic of opaque oil painting.

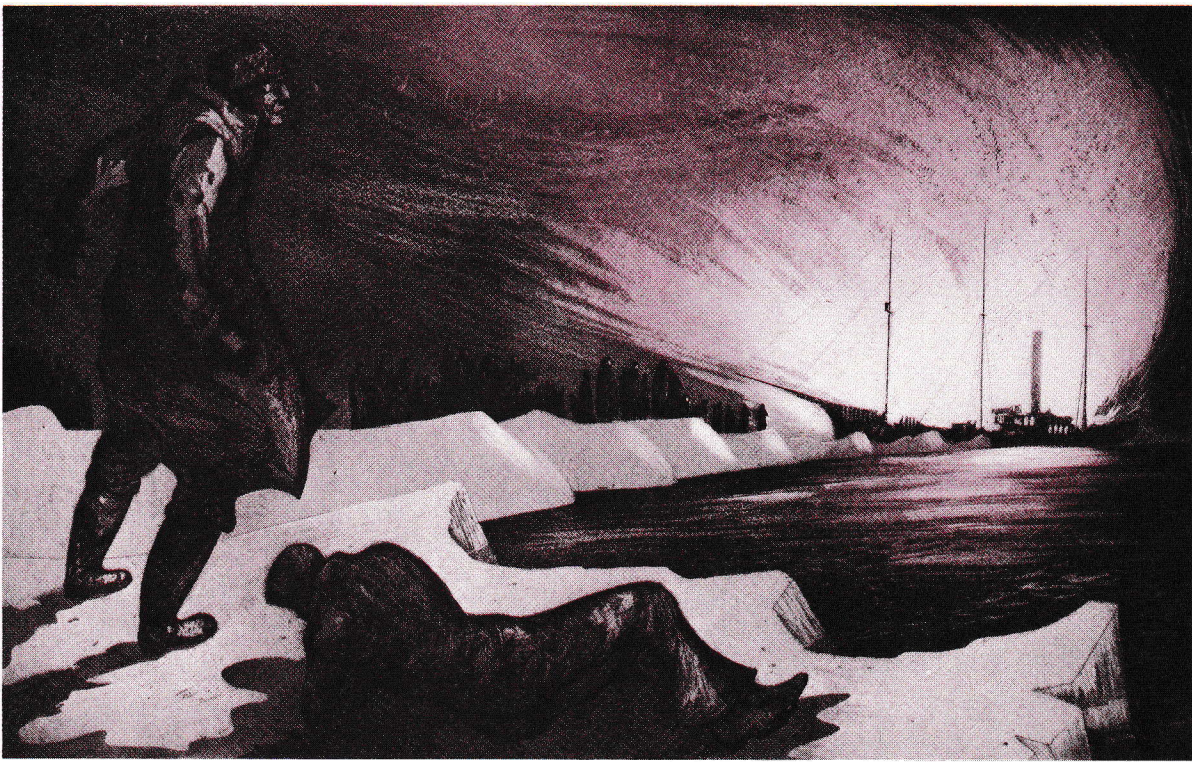

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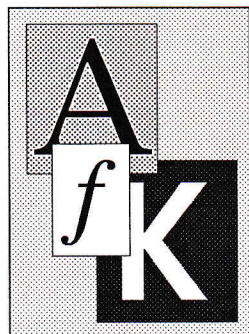
