

Arnold Shives is an internationally recognized Canadian painter and master print maker and is also a mountaineer of much renown.

Arnold Edward Shives was born December 27, 1943 in Vancouver, BC. As a child he recalls always loving to draw and has a vivid memory of encouragement from a classmate to whom he sold a drawing to at age 9. This early entrepreneurial success led him to sell his work door-to-door in his west-side neighborhood, further motivating the budding young artist!

Shives continued to develop his love of art during high school years at Lord Byng Secondary in Vancouver and later at U.B.C. where, in his freshman years, he audited painting classes with the ever inspiring Gordon Smith. In 1964, following two years at university, he moved to California to complete a BFA degree at the San Francisco Art Institute. There he was profoundly influenced by teacher Richard Diebenkorn and went on graduate with an MA in Painting from Stanford University.


In 1968 he returned to Vancouver and met Toni Onley who became a lifelong mentor and supporter of his work. Toni encouraged Arnold to pursue his imagery with professional galleries and met early success in both Vancouver and Toronto. Since that time he has worked as a full time artist exploring the serene nature of the landscape in painting, assemblage and through print making.

Shives' experiences as a mountain climber have provided a rich repertoire of imagery for his work over the years. He has made a number of first ascents of peaks from the north Cascades to the glaciated peaks of northern BC and has climbed with some of the province's top mountaineers. He is mentioned in Bruce Fairley's "Canadian Mountaineering Anthology" and in Phil Dowling's "Famous Climbers in Canada".

Exhibited across Canada, the United States, in South Africa, in Europe and in Japan, Shives work can be found in numerous public and private collections including the National Gallery of Canada in Ottawa, the San Francisco Art Museum and in the Artists for Kids Gallery in North Vancouver.

He has received a number of honours including Canada Council grants over the years and was appointed a member of the Royal Canadian Academy (RCA) in 2006. Arnold Shives lives and works at his home studio in North Vancouver with his wife Sue and their children.

The linoblock print "Spire Dance" was inspired by a dramatic cedar snag found on a trail in Bowen Island's Crippen Regional Park. Its raw simplicity, strong sculptural form and flashes of colourful floating light depict the magic of the forest experience for the artist. The bold play of thrusting forms juxtaposed with hidden foliage shapes combine in a powerful impeccably carved composition. "Spire Dance" is unmistakably Shives at his print making best!





The *Mountain Journal* *livre d'artiste* is a labour of love ten years in the making. It pays homage to "A Climbers Guide to the Coastal Ranges of British Columbia" a publication that has had a profound influence on the climbers of BC. The imagery was inspired from a variety of wilderness experiences from throughout the Pacific Northwest over the past 40 years and shows the artist's fascination with colour, light, composition, printmaking and, of course, the grandeur of the mountain landscape. The perceptive journal entries which accompany each image help picture the full mountain experience and adds a descriptive and interpretive dimension from the artist's perspective that one seldom enjoys. The *Mountain Journal* portfolio is Arnold Shives at his best and will surely become a print collector's treasure.

In the Mountains with Arnold

From early childhood, Arnold's passion for exploring the mountains of B.C. was instilled in him by his father who took him for hikes among the North Shore mountains, just as my father had taken me on fishing trips to explore the rocky coast of the Isle of Man. These early rambles connected us with nature and influenced us to become landscape artists -- in this regard, Arnold and I are soulmates.

We often cover the same ground in search of subjects. When I had a ski-plane, I used to fly to Garibaldi Park and land on Sentinel Glacier; now Arnold reaches the same glacier by climbing up to it. But where I could do a few watercolours and then fly home for supper, Arnold has to dry out his socks and boots and spend a cold night bivouacked on the mountain. Arnold travels light, often carrying only pen, India ink, and a sketch book, and he relies on wilderness skills and endurance to reach his landscape.

We see the same places but come up with very different imagery. We often tread in each other's footsteps, but at different times. However, on a few occasions, we have painted together. In 1988 we joined the Octagon Artists' Expedition to the Comox Glacier on Vancouver Island. A group of artists from across Canada were flown onto the glacier by Canada's Air Sea Rescue as part of one of their exercises. We all camped on the snow for a couple of nights. The second day I was perched on a rock at the edge of the glacier with my feet dangling over a 3,000 foot cliff that dropped into a little jewel of a valley, when I heard a voice grumbling on the wind. I looked around and I was alone. I then looked down at what looked like a thousand feet below me, sitting on a narrow ledge, was Arnold. He had dropped his pen which had lodged in a narrow crack in the rock. I suggested that he retrieve it by wrapping some tape around another pen, sticky side out, and pulling his pen out with it. "How did you

learn to do that," he called out as he recovered his pen. Our Airforce hosts kept a close eye on Arnold's wandering, not realizing he was a very experienced mountaineer.

Arnold is one of the most original printmakers Canada has produced. The sheer variety of his imagery is impressive, and is well illustrated in his portfolio Mountain Journal. I have followed Arnold's work with great interest for the past forty years. Over this period I have collected almost fifty of his prints, eventually donating them to the Art Gallery of Greater Victoria.


Some have called his works "Wilderness Sacraments." As a man of deep faith, this sense of landscape comes naturally to him. He reminds me of the early Christians who survived for almost a hundred years by clinging to places like Skellig Michael, a pinnacle of rock 18 miles from the Irish coast, and my own rock where I was born, the Isle of Man. Arnold, too, will survive to see the day when our museum curators will once again suffer from Stendahl Syndrome, the illness that comes from being overwhelmed by the beauty of art.



Arnold Shives





Arnold Shives is a senior Canadian artist living in Vancouver whose distinguished artistic career spans three decades. A graduate of the San Francisco Art Institute, Shives made his mark early, capturing both the San Francisco Art Institute's painting prize and the Carnegie Corporation of New York Fellowship. Since then, his work has been exhibited in Canada, the United States and Europe. His prints are particularly popular – combining a unique vision with masterly technique. They are avidly collected internationally by public institutions and corporations. The Vancouver Art Gallery, the San Francisco Museum of Art and the National Gallery of Canada, as well as Mobil Oil, Air Canada, Deloitte & Touche and the Bank of America own works by Shives. Shives is recognized as a master printmaker: he has participated in exhibitions across North America, and in Japan, Holland, Slovenia and Croatia.

Since 1995 he has been working with a new experimental three-dimensional process, as well as continuing his printmaking. The 3-D works – which hang on the wall like relief sculptures, originated out of the printmaking process. The wood block – which is traditionally used as the toolled-surface in printmaking, becomes the finished artwork itself. Shives has carved into and coloured these bas-reliefs. He then mounts some of them on corrugated metal, which provides a dynamic optical illusion of movement within the work as one passes by. Others include references to the natural world through found objects and obscured visual clues.

Yet for the last thirty years, it has been his works on paper – monotypes, linocuts, woodcuts and lithographs – which have earned him international recognition. These works have been executed in his explosive signature style imbued with spirituality. A Roman Catholic, Shives clearly links the natural world with the spiritual. He celebrates nature and creation as something that we should value and take care of. As such, he draws upon the pantheist tradition which can be found in the work of artists as diverse as Bellini, in his Pantheon of St. Francis, and the theosophist landscapes of Lawren Harris. In all of these works it is nature which draws people closer to God and the spirit. The art work then becomes the medium for that message. Shives's work is executed with confident skill and vision, which has been developed for almost forty years.




