

JANE ASH POITRAS

Internationally-acclaimed Edmonton artist Jane Ash Poitras is one of the fastest rising stars in the Canadian contemporary visual arts firmament.

Born October 11, 1951 in Fort Chipewyan, Alberta, and raised in a foster home in Edmonton, her abundant talent and academic achievement have provided a solid foundation on which she has built her still-blossoming career as an artist, lecturer, writer and philosopher.

Her academic achievements include a B.Sc. in Microbiology and a B.F.A. from the University of Alberta and M.F.A. in Print making from Columbia University in New York City.

Jane Ash Poitras' interest in art and her native heritage has evolved simultaneously during her adult years and has become the prime focus of her work in the last decade. She firmly believes that her work as an artist can assist in re-establishing a common pride and identity for North America's first peoples as well as providing a greater understanding of first nations culture to all who view her art.


Her imagery is narrative in nature and is built upon a combination of symbols of her own and other Native heritages, modern culture and the language of contemporary fine art. She has been profoundly influenced by the cultural collages of Robert Rauschenberg, constructivist Kurt Schwitters and the ethereal paintings of Mark Rothko, but her powerful imagery is born of her own quest to heal humanity.

Over the past 10 years her art work has been exhibited in numerous solo and group exhibitions in commercial and public galleries and museums in Canada, the United States and around the world. Her work is also included in numerous public, corporate and private collections including the Brooklyn Museum in New York, the Museum of Civilization in Hull and in the Vancouver, Edmonton and Winnipeg Art Galleries.

BUFFALO REBIRTH

Indian legend has long foretold that the birth of a white bison would signal the dawn of a positive new era for North America's First Nations. That birth occurred in Wisconsin in 1994, and has attracted pilgrimages from Native leaders who have made the journey to Wisconsin as a tribute to this legendary omen.

Poitras has chosen to make her tribute in the form of a striking 18 colour serigraph print, "Buffalo Rebirth". As with so many of her works, this image was born of her dreams and visions, and is masterfully executed using the full resources of her considerable print making experience, knowledge and skills, as well as her acknowledged and acclaimed inspiration and creativity.




Jane Ash Poitras proudly reviews a proof of her limited edition print Buffalo Rebirth

Since time immemorial, herbs have been on Mother Earth.



Traditionally, the herbalist was one of the most respected members of the community - he was the pharmacist and knew the secrets of the plants.


In North America we have many unknown indigenous plants that have healing powers.


“Apache Puberty Pollen Ceremony” 2001 Mixed Media on Linen 31" x 31"
